**Welcome to 2009!**

A new year of grace from the Lord! A new year by which God is able to transform us more into the image of his Son, Jesus Christ.

As we begin this new year, we humbly submit, for your consideration, these **Simple Liturgical Resolutions for the New Year, 2009.**

1. I resolve in the next year to treat each Sunday Eucharist as the most important event of that week.
2. I resolve in the next year to do all I can to participate more fully in the celebration of the Sunday Mass. For example:
  - I resolve to sing all the songs and acclamations.
  - I resolve to respond in the liturgy with conviction and whole-heartedness;
  - I resolve to respond in the liturgy with conviction and whole-heartedness;
  - I resolve to make use of the liturgical silence by praying as I've been invited to do.
3. I resolve in the next year to read prayerfully and carefully the Sunday scriptures at least once during the week before Mass.
4. I resolve in the next year to arrive before Mass begins and to leave the church only after the liturgy has ended.
5. I resolve in the next year to take part in at least two other liturgical celebrations of the Church, as they are celebrated in my parish, in addition to Sunday Mass (e.g., one of the sacraments, seasonal Reconciliation services, prayer services, Morning or Evening Prayer, blessings, Eucharistic devotions, etc.).
6. I resolve in the next year to take the dismissal of the Mass—"Go in the peace of Christ; the Mass is ended, go in peace; Go in peace to love and serve the Lord"—seriously, and to somehow make it *real* in my life during the week.
7. I resolve in the next year to pay careful attention to the homily during Mass, in an attempt to hear the voice of the Lord speaking to me in relation to that day's scriptures.

**Feast of the Epiphany**

Today is the traditional day of Epiphany—the "Twelfth Day of Christmas." On this day we mark the apex, as it were, of the Christmas season. Today we acknowledge and celebrate that the child born in a lowly manger in the darkness of night is revealed as the *manifestation* of God (the literal meaning of Epiphany). All manifestations of God are "lights" that shine through Christ, illuminating and revealing a deeper understanding of his identity.

Traditionally, three events in the life of Christ are remembered as manifestations of God's presence and action through Christ.

1. the visit of the Magi: Matthew 2:1-12
2. the Wedding Feast of Cana: John 2:1-11
3. the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River: Mt. 3:13-17, Mk 1:9-11, Lk 3:21-22

Today is also the traditional day for blessing homes and other buildings by marking the lintels of doorways. The markings commemorate the three Magi traditionally known by the names Casper, Melchior, and Balthaser. The markings for 2009 are 20 + C + M + B + 09. These letters represent the three initials of the Magi's names written between the numbers of the year, separated by four crosses.

**Celebrating the Feast of Epiphany/(Read Matthew 2:1-12)**

This feast has been celebrated around the Christian world for hundreds of years. This feast is usually celebrated twelve days after Christmas. Epiphany means “showing”, “revealing” or “manifesting”. Epiphany marks the visit of the Magi to Bethlehem. Magi comes from the Greek word *magos*, meaning great or illustrious. Magi were a higher class of people who may have been members of the king’s court, or doctors, scientist, astrologers, and/or mathematicians. They are also referred to as the “Three Kings” or “Wise Men”.

There is a tradition in the Orient that twelve Magi visited Jesus at his birth, but because of the scriptural reference to the three gifts (Matthew 2:11) three Magi are generally accepted. The legend says that the first of the Magi to visit Jesus was call *Melchior*. He was believed to be the ruler of Nubia and Arabia, a man of some sixty years who brought gold to Jesus, the king.

The second of the Magi was *Kaspar*, ruler of Tarsus in Turkey, said to be about twenty years and beardless. He offered frankincense, symbolizing the divinity of Jesus. The third, *Balthasar*, ruler of Ethiopia, was forty years old and of dark complexion. He brought myrrh, which predicted the death of Jesus. (In actuality, frankincense was used for embalming, while myrrh was used as a perfume and a medicine.)

When the Magi arrived in Bethlehem, God was showing or revealing himself not just to Abraham or his family or the whole nation of Israel, but to all of us in the world as well. Wherever you come from, whatever you look like and whatever language you speak, God is saying to us today that he is here for each of us and no one is left out. So, Epiphany celebrates that God, in the person of Jesus, has revealed or shown himself to us.

The story of the Magi also reminds us to be aware of signs that God gives us through ordinary people and events. The Magi followed a star that they knew was different from all the others in the sky. By answering God’s invitation, the Magi were among the first to see the Messiah.

**Gold:** A yellow, malleable, metallic element. Represents wealth-riches.

**Frankincense:** A sweet smelling gum resin, taken from the Frankincense tree of Southern Arabia. It is one of the world’s finest burning incense. It was a gift treasured by Kings and worthy of use in the temple of ancient Israel.

**Myrrh:** A sweet smelling gum resin taken from the trees indigenous to the banks of the Red Sea. Treasured by Kings and used in the holy anointing oil used in the Tabernacle of ancient Israel.

**Home Blessing**

One of the traditions of Epiphany is performing a home blessing each year. Use the following as a guide to bless your home. Be sure all members of your family are present when you do this blessing. You can also invite a priest over to perform a blessing.

**Leader:** In the name of the father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

(All making the sign of the cross)

**All:** And also with you.

**Leader:** Lord Jesus Christ, the three wise men presented their gifts to you in praise and adoration:

grant that we (living in this house) may use our talents and abilities to your greater glory. Amen.

**Leader:** (Beginning and ending at the front door of your home, walk from room to room sprinkling each space in your Home and each member of your family with holy water. Be sure to include doorways, porches, and other sacred spaces in your home. If available, you can sprinkle the holy water using an evergreen branch. Pray the following as you begin the blessing.)

*Bless this space, O Lord, and those who pass this way.  
Deliver us from every evil and show us your face.*

Ending at the front door of your home, mark the doorway (top of the door or frame) with the current year plus the initials of the three wise men. Place a + cross between the initials.

Example: 20 + B + G + M 09

**Conclude with the following prayer:**

Bless our home, Lord, with peace and the joy of Your presence. Heal all of our family who are in Need of your touch. Teach us how to offer hospitality to every guest, seeing your face in every stranger and welcoming all who enter here as you welcome us into your kingdom in this life and the next. Amen.

## THE EPIPHANY

The Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles and the visit of the Wise Men to the Christ child. Epiphany is celebrated on January 6.

The word Magi, in Greek magoi, comes from the Latin word meaning "sage." These particular sages were possibly Zoroastrian astrologers from Persia. Upon seeing a star rising in the East (the Star of Bethlehem), they realized it was a sign that the king of the Jews had been born. According to St. Ignatius of Antioch, the star shone with inexpressible brilliance, and the sun, moon and other stars all formed a chorus around the special star (Letter to the Ephesians, 19). The wise men followed the star to Bethlehem of Judea, and to Jesus' dwelling there. Having arrived they worshipped the infant Jesus, and gave him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

There have been numerous traditions that have grown up about the Wise Men. Typically we think of there being three wise men because of the number of gifts, but Matthew doesn't tell us the exact number. Since the 3<sup>rd</sup> century, Christian writers have referred to them as kings, even though Matthew doesn't specifically tell us that they were royalty. Their names in the West, Gaspar (or Caspar), Melchior, and Balthasar date to the 6<sup>th</sup> century. The names mean: Master-of-Treasure, King and Protect-the-King, respectively.

# MISSION DAY 2009

## Purpose

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, over 50 million Americans suffer from mental illness every year and over 32,000 suicides are completed. The purpose of this day is to help caregivers understand the confusion, emptiness and frustration affecting family members and friends of people with mental health problems and suicide survivors (family members and friends of one who commits suicide) and to learn how they can help these individuals discover and nurture "Hope for a Balanced Life".

## Who Should Attend the Program

This program is designed for: Cemetery Workers, Funeral Directors, Clergy, Pastoral Ministers, Bereavement Ministers, Chaplains, Lay Ministers, Nurses, Social Workers, Counselors, Educators, Hospice Personnel, and others caring for family members and loved ones challenged by mental illness and the experience of suicide.

## About the Karla Smith Foundation


Karla's seven-year struggle with bipolar disorder began when she was 19. It culminated with her suicide at age 26. In her memory, the Smith family continues her commitment to help other families face these challenges.

The Karla Smith Foundation, founded by Tom, her father, Fran, her mother, and Kevin, her twin brother, is an avenue to share family experiences which similarly impact thousands of others.

With support groups, peer-to-peer coaching, education programs, and awareness events, the KSF helps bring balance into lives that are affected by people with mental illness or suicide of a loved one.

Mental illness and suicide create an imbalance in the emotional, mental, spiritual, and behavioral lives of the family and friends of someone with mental illness as well as suicide survivors. Most often the family and friends are confused, empty, and frustrated by the behavior of their loved one. Their balance is gone, and they see little hope for a "normal" life.

The KSF believes there is hope for a balanced life. Even if there is an untreated person with mental illness in the family and even in the aftermath of suicide, there is hope.

Since that time, the Smith's, along with Karla's twin brother, Kevin, have worked to provide support groups, peer-to-peer coaching, education programs and awareness events for families devastated by mental illness or suicide.



Tom is a retired director of Pastoral Services in the diocese of Belleville. He has authored 5 books, including *The Tattered Tapestry*, a book written about the family's experience through Karla's illness and death. His most recent book, *A Balanced Life—9 Strategies for Coping with Mental Health Problems of a Loved One*, was released last fall.



Fran is a former teacher, counselor, and principal. After forty years in education she retired in June of 2004. Since her life is now more leisurely, she volunteers by tutoring in the Adult Literacy Program and teaching and preparing food for parish funeral dinners. She also devotes much time and energy to the Karla Smith Foundation.

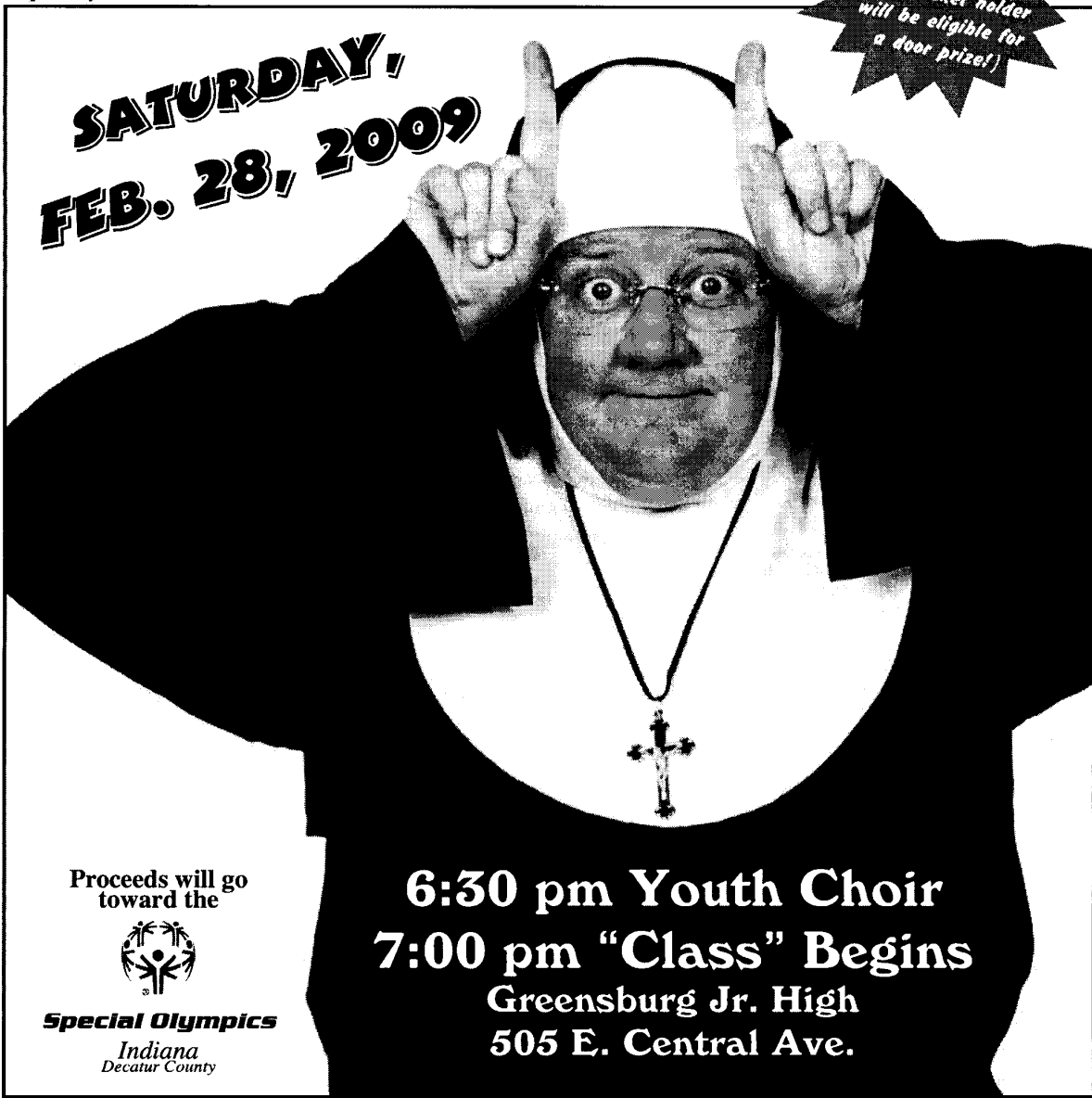
