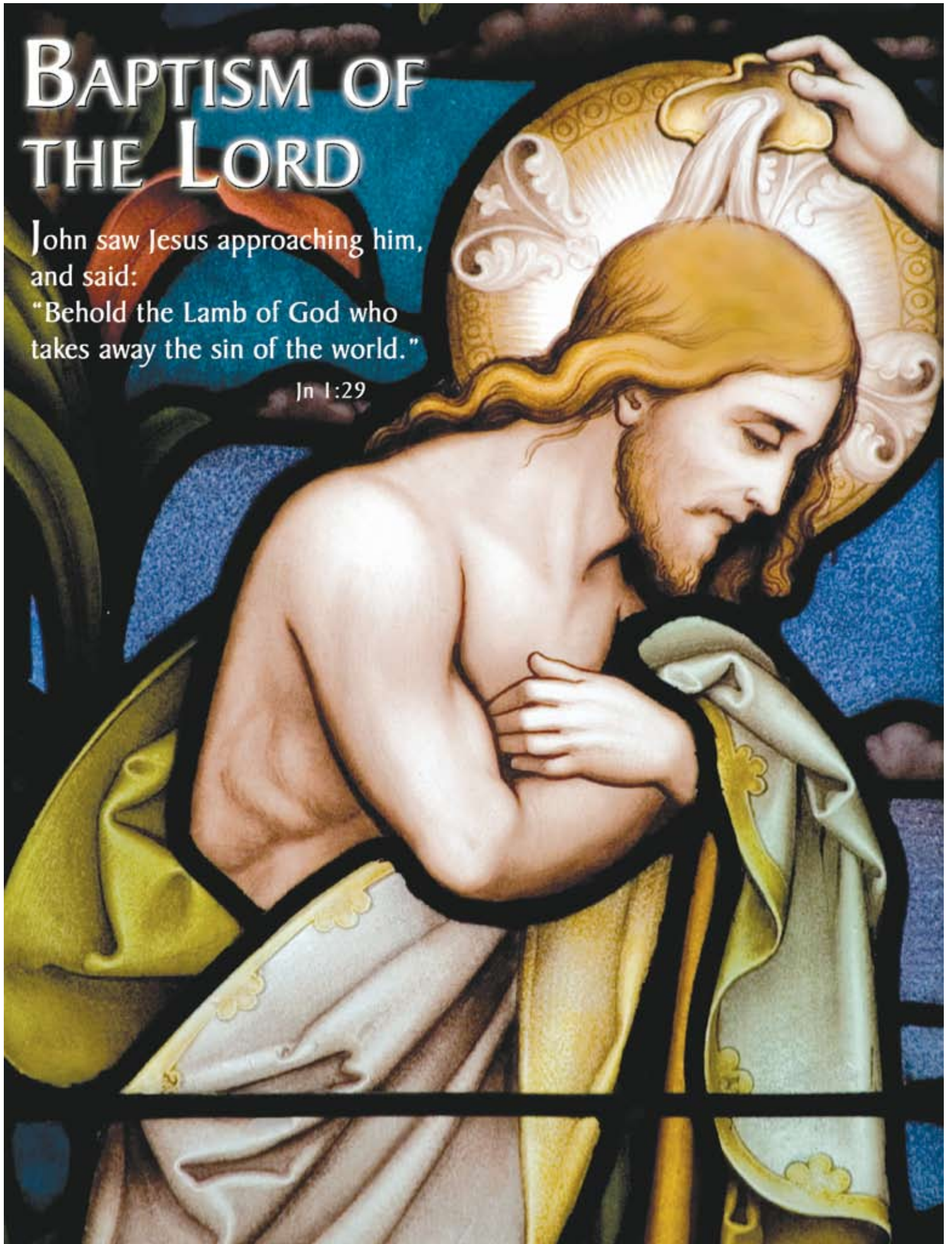

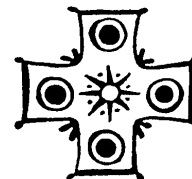
A CHRISTMAS FLOWER THANK YOU!!

Happy New Year from all of the staff and students of St. Mary's School! We took a few weeks off from our usual schedule of learning and writing these articles, but now we are ready to start the new semester with renewed energy and focus. The building is shiny and clean for a fresh start in 2009. This month we will introduce you to our sixth grade teachers and let you catch a glimpse of what our eldest students are learning and doing.

Miss Marge Bruns has been teaching sixth grade at St. Mary's for 12 years and she says that she still loves her students "dearly" as if they were her own. Her philosophy is "let's have fun while learning." If you've ever walked by her classroom, you know that she means it. Short History of Baptism

The history of Baptism is a rich one. It begins with the many stories about water in the Old Testament. In creation God separates the waters from one another and the land. Through God's intervention Noah saves his family from destruction by building an ark as shelter from the storm. Moses parts the Red Sea with God's power, to save the Israelites from the Egyptians. Later the Israelites enter the Promised Land by crossing the Jordan River. All these events are early examples of God's saving power, which will be fully revealed in Baptism.

In the New Testament, Jesus himself submits to Baptism by John the Baptist, an event that is recorded in all four Gospels, thus demonstrating for us the importance of Baptism. He tells Nicodemus that no one can enter the Kingdom of God unless they are "born of water and Spirit." And in Matthew his final words to his disciples are, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Thus the biblical evidence is quite clear that Christ established the sacrament of Baptism. It is no surprise that Baptism is the first sacrament the early Church practiced. The Acts of the Apostles describes group baptisms, individual baptisms, and baptisms of families or households. In these first years after Christ's Ascension, baptisms were focused on adult converts, and seemed to occur quickly without a lot of preparation.

But as the years progressed, we find that the Baptism ritual became more complex. We have evidence in the second and third centuries that it became common for people to go through extensive preparation, called the catechumenate, before being baptized and joining the Church. Those that were in the process of initiation were called catechumens. Their preparation would consist of study, prayer, fasting, and service to others over a period of two or three years. During this time each catechumen would be under the care of a sponsor, a mature Christian acting as a model and guide.

All this preparation was building to the Easter Vigil, a special liturgy held the evening before Easter Sunday. During the weeks before the Easter Vigil, the catechumens entered a more intense time of prayer and fasting. At the beginning of the Easter Vigil, the catechumens would gather, men in one room, women in another. As the ritual began, they faced the west and denounced Satan and all his works. Then to symbolize their conversion, they would turn and face the east, the direction of the sunrise, and shout their commitment to Christ.

Then the catechumens went to rooms with pools, where they stripped off their old clothing. They were anointed with oil, and then stepped into the waist-deep waters. The bishop submerged each candidate three times – in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. When they emerged they were no longer catechumens but newly baptized Christians. They were given new white robes, anointed again with oil, embraced in a sign of peace, and given a lighted candle. They were then led to a room in which the Eucharist was celebrated, and they received Communion for the first time.

Things changed around the fourth century, when Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire. Whole families were converted and baptized, and soon almost all adults were Christians. In this way infant baptisms became the norm by the year 500. As the doctrine of original sin was more widely taught, people wanted their children to be baptized as soon as possible because they thought that an unbaptized baby who died would not go to heaven. But now with so many Christians, bishops could no longer preside at every baptism. Priests began presiding over most baptisms, but they delayed the final parts of the ceremony (the final anointing with oil) until the bishop was available to "confirm" the initiation. That is how the sacrament of Confirmation became separated from Baptism.

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, over 50 million Americans suffer from mental illness every year and over 32,000 suicides are completed. The purpose of this day is to help caregivers understand the confusion, emptiness and frustration affecting family members and friends of people with mental health problems and suicide survivors (family members and friends of one who commits suicide) and to learn how they can help these individuals discover and nurture "Hope for a Balanced Life".

Who Should Attend the Program

This program is designed for: Cemetery Workers, Funeral Directors, Clergy, Pastoral Ministers, Bereavement Ministers, Chaplains, Lay Ministers, Nurses, Social Workers, Counselors, Educators, Hospice Personnel, and others caring for family members and loved ones challenged by mental illness and the experience of suicide.

About the Karla Smith Foundation


Karla's seven-year struggle with bipolar disorder began when she was 19. It culminated with her suicide at age 26. In her memory, the Smith family continues her commitment to help other families face these challenges.

The Karla Smith Foundation, founded by Tom, her father, Fran, her mother, and Kevin, her twin brother, is an avenue to share family experiences which similarly impact thousands of others.

With support groups, peer-to-peer coaching, education programs, and awareness events, the KSF helps bring balance into lives that are affected by people with mental illness or suicide of a loved one.

Mental illness and suicide create an imbalance in the emotional, mental, spiritual, and behavioral lives of the family and friends of someone with mental illness as well as suicide survivors. Most often the family and friends are confused, empty, and frustrated by the behavior of their loved one. Their balance is gone, and they see little hope for a "normal" life.

The KSF believes there is hope for a balanced life. Even if there is an untreated person with mental illness in the family and even in the aftermath of suicide, there is hope.

Since her life is now more leisurely, she volunteers by tutoring in the Adult Literacy Program and teaching and preparing food for parish funeral dinners. She also devotes much time and energy to the Karla Smith Foundation.

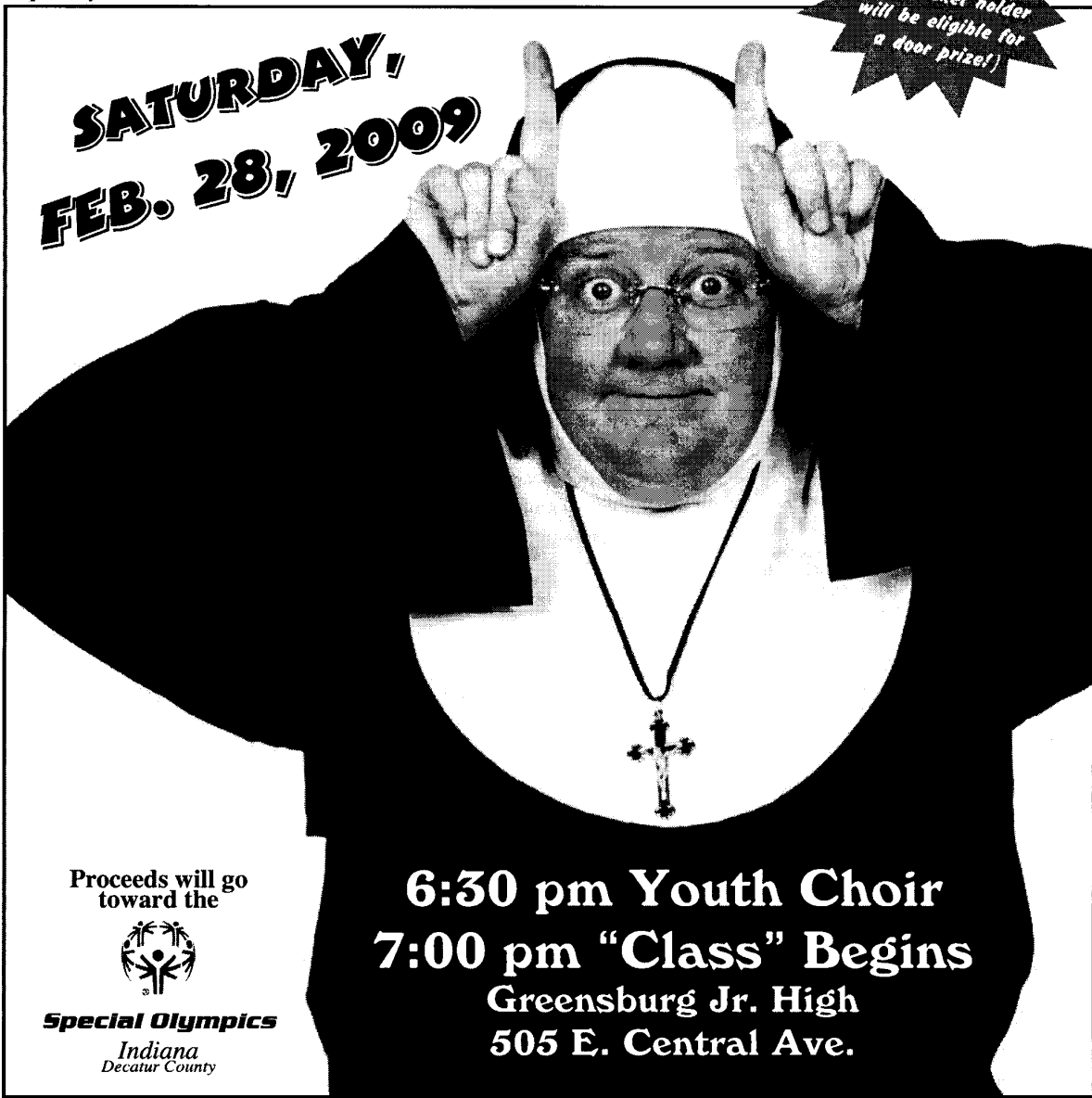

What qualities are looked for in a priest?
