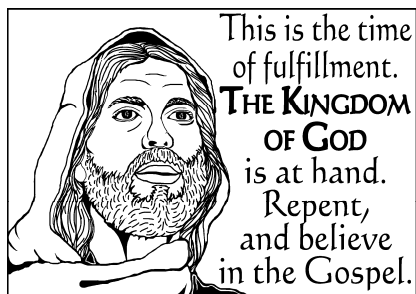

**Lent 2009 – “The Glory of the Cross”**

Our Lenten journey begins with the celebration of Ash Wednesday, February 25. Mass times are 7:00 a.m., 8:30 a.m., 5:30 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. Each year the Lenten season gives us the opportunity to deepen our faith and focus on the glory and the power of the Cross.

**Family Stations of the Cross** will be prayed every Friday evening during Lent, beginning at 7:00 p.m. Also, on Wednesday evening at 6:45 p.m. as part of the Religious Education program.

**The Assembly's Book of Petitions** will once again be placed in the rear of church for your special intentions. Each weekend we will pray for the intentions of the assembly.

We will also pray for our seminarians with a special calendar prepared with pictures and names of each seminarian, as we remember one of these men each day during our Lenten season. The calendar has been placed in the Parish Speaker for your convenience.

**Fast, abstinence rules for Lent:** Ash Wednesday was February 25<sup>th</sup> which marked the beginning of Lent. This solemn season is a penitential period that leads to the celebration of Easter, on April 12<sup>th</sup>. Ash Wednesday, February 25<sup>th</sup> and Good Friday, April 10<sup>th</sup> are days of complete fast and abstinence. **FAST** binds all over 18 and less than 59 years of age. On the days of fast, one full meal is allowed, two small meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal one full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. **ABSTINENCE** binds all over age 14. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. (NOTE: When health or ability to work is affected, the law does not apply.)

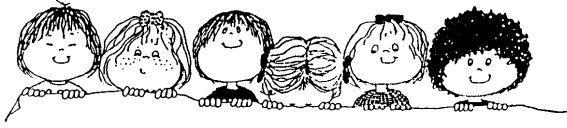

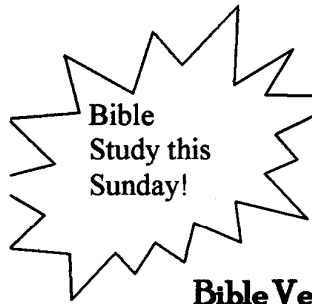

## Jesus and the 40 days:

Today's gospel talks about the Spirit leading Jesus into the desert for 40 days and being tempted by Satan. Let's look at that a little more.

The gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke all tell us that Jesus spent forty days in the desert after his baptism in the Jordan River.

Jesus' desert experience reminds us of the Israelites who were freed from Egyptian slavery only to wander in the desert for forty years on their way to the Promise Land. During that time, they were tempted and they sinned. Jesus reversed that failure. The devil tempts Jesus to turn stones into bread, to jump from the roof of the Temple to show that God will protect him, and to worship Satan in return for political power to accomplish his mission. By his faithfulness to God, Jesus overcame the same temptations presented to the Israelites in the desert.

The practice of preparing for Easter with six weeks of prayer, fasting, almsgiving, and penance has its origin around the late fourth century.

Apparently, the preparation for Easter was limited to catechumens in the final stages of preparation for baptism at the Easter Vigil and to members of the faithful who joined them out of solidarity.

Originally, there was a seven-week observance in the Eastern rite churches and a six-week observance in the Roman Catholic Church. Neither church counted Sundays as part of Lent, and the Eastern Catholics didn't count Saturdays. Some time later, the Roman Church added Ash Wednesday and the rest of that week to make exactly forty days.

Liturgically, Lent ends before the Eucharistic liturgy on Holy Thursday. Holy Thursday evening, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday – the sacred Triduum – are the high point of the Church's liturgical year celebration.

Knowing Lent developed over several centuries, we can appreciate even more fully our heritage and those who contributed to it. Perhaps we will also feel a greater sense of responsibility to hand on the tradition to future generations.

## Meatless Fridays

According to an urban legend, the pope, cardinals, and bishops initiated abstinence from meat on Friday to promote the pope's fishing business. Nah! That legend had no foundation in fact. St. Peter, the first pope, was a fisherman, and Jesus said to the apostles, "I will make you fishers of men." (Matthew 4:19) Yet subsequent popes have had no financial or economic interest in the fishing business despite the bizarre rumor.

The tradition goes back to the first century, when Christians abstained from eating meat on Fridays to honor Jesus' death on the cross on Good Friday. Because Jesus sacrificed this flesh for the salvation of humankind, the flesh of warm-blooded animals wasn't consumed on Friday.

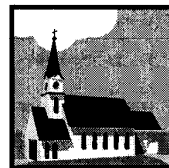

## THE SYMPHONY OF FAITH

*A parish mission that draws its inspiration from the four parts of the Catechism of the Catholic Church*

When Pope John Paul II approved the Catechism of the Catholic Church composed under the direction of the current pope, Benedict XVI, he called it a "symphony of faith," and he expressed the hope that it would "serve the renewal to which the Holy Spirit ceaselessly calls the Church of God, the Body of Christ on her pilgrimage to the undiminished light of the kingdom." It has been adapted to the American culture in the recently published, "United States Catholic Catechism for Adults."

### EVENING THEMES

**JESUS CHRIST:** *Our Lord and Savior* - The Bible is enthroned and the preacher is commissioned. We then focus on Jesus Christ. Everything in the catechism flows from our faith in Him, the cornerstone of the Catholic Church. This service is the overture to the symphony. It concludes with a ritual that affirms our participation in the New Creation.

**CREED:** *The Profession of Faith* - God made us to know Him, to love Him and to serve Him in this world. The first part of the catechism helps us to know God more clearly. All are invited to receive a copy of the creed with the assurance, "Believe this and you will live."

**SACRAMENTS:** *The Celebration of the Christian Mystery* - Our belief in God draws us into the celebration of the sacred liturgy where we experience and express the love that joins us together in his Son, Jesus Christ. We affirm our baptism, the gateway to all the other sacraments.

**COMMANDMENTS:** *Our Life in Christ* - The love of God poured into our lives through the sacraments impels us to serve God and grow in holiness according to the pattern we have in Christ. The service leads to an examination of conscience and the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance. The missionary is also available for confessions on the following day.

**CHRISTIAN PRAYER:** *A Personal Relationship with God* - God made us to be happy with him forever in heaven. Through prayer in its many forms we taste that happiness even on earth. Because prayer also aligns us with God's will for all creation we dedicate ourselves with our various gifts to bring all things together in Christ.

### MORNING PROGRAM

To complement the evening service, the missionary celebrates and preaches at morning Mass. After light refreshments in the social hall he gives a brief informal talk. The topics are: the Greatest Commandment, the Second Great Commandment, and Good Grief. In place of a final talk there is a question and answer session.



## **SYMPHONY OF FAITH**

Like the movements of a symphony there is a harmony among the four parts of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. We believe in God's revelation in Jesus Christ, and we celebrate the Mystery of Faith in the sacraments. In our love for God we live as Jesus taught us and we draw ever closer to God in prayer.
