Lent 2009 – “The Glory of the Cross”

Our Lenten journey has begun. Each year the Lenten season gives us the opportunity to deepen our faith and focus on the glory and the power of the Cross.

Many opportunities will be provided to help us as we follow God's call to "Take Christ to the World." Each family has received Lenten booklets for family prayer. All youth of St. Mary's will be receiving special Lenten cards with prayers for Stations to be prayed.

Family Stations of the Cross will be prayed every Friday evening during Lent, beginning at 7:00 p.m. and also, on Wednesday evening at 6:45 p.m. Both evenings will be followed with a Communion Service.

The Assembly's Book of Petitions are placed in the rear of church for your special intentions. Each weekend we will pray for the intentions of the assembly.

We will also pray for our seminarians with a special calendar prepared with pictures and names of each seminarian, as we remember one of these men each day during our Lenten season. The calendar has been placed in the Parish Speaker and last weeks (March 1) bulletin for your convenience. Please place the calendar in a prominent place in your home as you make this a part of your Lenten family prayer.

Fast, abstinence rules for Lent: Ash Wednesday is February 25th which marks the beginning of Lent. This solemn season is a penitential period that leads to the celebration of Easter, on April 12th. Ash Wednesday, February 25th and Good Friday, April 10th are days of complete fast and abstinence. **All Fridays during lent are days of abstinence.** **FAST** binds all over 18 and less than 59 years of age. On the days of fast, one full meal is allowed, two small meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal one full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. **ABSTINENCE** binds all over age 14. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. (NOTE: When health or ability to work is affected, the law does not apply.)

Please watch the bulletin each week for all special Lenten activities.

Dear Community,

I hope you are all having a good Lenten season. The annual Lenten season is the fitting time to climb the holy mountain of Easter. The Lenten season has a double character, namely to prepare both catechumens and faithful to celebrate the paschal mystery. The catechumens, both with the rite of election and scrutinies, and by catechesis, are prepared for the celebration of the sacraments of Christian initiation; the faithful, ever more attentive to the word of God and prayer, prepare themselves by penance for the renewal of their baptismal promises.

The purpose of Lent is to bring us to compunction. Compunction is etymologically related to the verb "to puncture" and suggests the deflation of our inflated egos, a challenge to any self-deceit about the quality of our lives as disciples of Jesus. By hitting us again and again with demands which we not only fail to obey, but which we came to recognize as being quite beyond us, the Gospel passages are meant to trouble us, to confront our illusions about ourselves. "Remember, you are dust..." From this perspective, Lenten penance may be more effective if we fail in our resolutions than if we succeed, for its purpose is not to confirm us in our sense of virtue but to bring home to us our radical need of salvation.

My personal Lenten resolution is to visit all the sick in the nursing homes or in their own homes and administer the sacrament of the sick. Call me if you want me to come to your home. Eucharistic ministers of the sick, please give me your list of people in nursing homes or private homes that you visit so I can visit them, too. Thanks.

Lost your glasses? Many people who cannot find their glasses after searching everywhere ask Saint Anthony for help. After ransacking the whole area, many even pray to Saint Jude, known as the patron saint of lost causes. It is usually after all this turmoil that searchers discover they have been wearing the glasses all this time. It's strange, but sometimes we can't see things even though they are right in plain sight. Today's Gospel presents Jesus in a new light. He is transfigured before the astonished eyes of his disciples. Clearly, Jesus is more than he appears. He is the Son of God.

Why do we 'give up something' for Lent?

Forms of penance, and penitential spirit, have been part of the Church from its earliest days. The teaching and practice of Jesus were continued by his disciples. The early Christian community at Jerusalem gave up the ownership of their goods for the support of the community (Acts 2:44; 4:32). Saint Paul presented his self-imposed penance as an example for all Christians (1 Corinthians 9:27).

The early leaders of the Church wrote that the purpose for works of penance was the desire to answer the Lord's invitation to imitate him when carrying a cross (Luke 9:23), reparation for sin, and mastery of various human drives (1 Corinthians 9:27).

If we look at our lives, we quickly realize the need to do something to prevent us from becoming totally self-centered. We need something that will help us consider not only the amount of food we eat but also: how we spend our day; the possessions we amass as member of a consumer society; and the attempts we make to bring the Lord into our daily lives. Therefore, anything that turns us back to God as our center in appropriate penance.

It might mean turning off the television for a while of canceling that unnecessary shopping spree to spend time with the Lord. An increased commitment to prayer might be a real penance for some!

A real act of penance might involve taking your time, talent, or treasure and ministering to the needs of others, especially the poor and most abandoned of your neighborhood. Look around and try to discover the needs in your community.

The genuine Christian follows Jesus by taking up a cross as he did. It is up to you to determine if that cross will be carried halfheartedly or wholeheartedly.

St. Patrick

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints.

Patrick was born around 385 in Scotland, probably Kilpatrick. His parents were Calpornius and Conchessa, who were Romans living in Britain in charge of the colonies.

As a boy of fourteen or so, he was captured during a raiding party and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. Ireland at this time was a land of Druids and pagans. He learned the language and practices of the people who held him. During his captivity, he turned to God in prayer.

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain, where he reunited with his family.

He began his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained by St. Germanus, the Bishop of Auxerre, whom he had studied under for years. Later, Patrick was ordained a bishop, and was sent to take the Gospel to Ireland. He arrived in Ireland March 25, 433, at Slane.

Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God in Confessions. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461. He died at Saul, where he had built the first church.

Why a shamrock? Patrick used the shamrock to explain the Trinity, and has been associated with him and the Irish since that time.

THE PARISH MISSION IS NOW We welcome Fr. George Knab, A Missionary Oblate of Mary Immaculate from Chicago, who is preaching at all the Masses this weekend to urge us to be renewed in the life of Christ by participating in special services that begin March 8 at 7:00 p.m. The Sacrament of Penance will be offered on Wednesday evening. A complete schedule is found in the bulletin last week and was in the parish speaker.

Lenten Bible Study – Based on the Gospel message found in John, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16). Each day we make choices and can choose to keep our focus on Jesus. During Lent especially let us draw closer to God and be conscious that the decisions we make lead us nearer to God's love.

We have 30 books available for this 6-week bible study at no cost to our parishioners. Call some friends – get a group together – come in and pick up some books at the parish office. Or pick one up for individual use. (While supplies last).

Life Challenges – Job Loss and Family

Attitudes and communication have a great impact on how a family copes with job lost. Because expenses affect the whole family, talk with your children about your situation. Let them know each family member will need to change their spending practices. Involve them in determining a budget (entertainment, dining out). When family members understand the tough choices that must be made and have a voice in making those decisions, they are more willing to accept the changes. Difficult times come to almost everyone, but the Bible reminds us that ". . . God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19).

A Scrutiny – what is that?

Scrutinies are rites of self-searching and repentance. When people from another spiritual background seek baptism in the Catholic Church, they do so by stages. First we accept them into the order of catechumens. Then as they complete their catechetical formation we enroll them among the "elect", or those chosen for baptism. This rite of election generally coincides with the beginning of Lent. Three times during Lent the church prays the scrutinies to encourage a spirit of repentance among those who seek a worthy celebration of baptism.

The priest prays that the spirit of good be present in them. Their purpose is not so much to examine the candidates' mental readiness, but their spiritual readiness. Scrutinies offer the catechumens the support they need to approach the waters of baptism worthily. For those who are already baptized, the scrutinies invite us to embrace the same spirit of self-searching and repentance. At Easter we renew our baptismal promises as we see the catechumens baptized. So during Lent we renew our repentance as we see the catechumens scrutinized. The scrutinies remind us of the seriousness of our Christian life and inspire us to turn from evil and pursue good. They enliven our recommitment to Christ at Easter.

LENT FACTS

The Lenten Color purple is a color of royalty, which symbolizes the suffering of Jesus and anticipates the glory of the Resurrection.

Lent lasts for 40 weekdays, beginning Ash Wednesday and concludes sundown on Holy Thursday.

THE SYMPHONY OF FAITH

A parish mission that draws its inspiration from the four parts of the Catechism of the Catholic Church

When Pope John Paul II approved the Catechism of the Catholic Church composed under the direction of the current pope, Benedict XVI, he called it a "symphony of faith," and he expressed the hope that it would "serve the renewal to which the Holy Spirit ceaselessly calls the Church of God, the Body of Christ on her pilgrimage to the undiminished light of the kingdom." It has been adapted to the American culture in the recently published, "United States Catholic Catechism for Adults."

EVENING THEMES

JESUS CHRIST: *Our Lord and Savior* - The Bible is enthroned and the preacher is commissioned. We then focus on Jesus Christ. Everything in the catechism flows from our faith in Him, the cornerstone of the Catholic Church. This service is the overture to the symphony. It concludes with a ritual that affirms our participation in the New Creation.

CREED: *The Profession of Faith* - God made us to know Him, to love Him and to serve Him in this world. The first part of the catechism helps us to know God more clearly. All are invited to receive a copy of the creed with the assurance, "Believe this and you will live."

SACRAMENTS: *The Celebration of the Christian Mystery* - Our belief in God draws us into the celebration of the sacred liturgy where we experience and express the love that joins us together in his Son, Jesus Christ. We affirm our baptism, the gateway to all the other sacraments.

COMMANDMENTS: *Our Life in Christ* - The love of God poured into our lives through the sacraments impels us to serve God and grow in holiness according to the pattern we have in Christ. The service leads to an examination of conscience and the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance. The missionary is also available for confessions on the following day.

CHRISTIAN PRAYER: *A Personal Relationship with God* - God made us to be happy with him forever in heaven. Through prayer in its many forms we taste that happiness even on earth. Because prayer also aligns us with God's will for all creation we dedicate ourselves with our various gifts to bring all things together in Christ.

MORNING PROGRAM

To complement the evening service, the missionary celebrates and preaches at morning Mass. After light refreshments in the social hall he gives a brief informal talk. The topics are: the Greatest Commandment, the Second Great Commandment, and Good Grief. In place of a final talk there is a question and answer session.

SYMPHONY OF FAITH

Like the movements of a symphony there is a harmony among the four parts of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. We believe in God's revelation in Jesus Christ, and we celebrate the Mystery of Faith in the sacraments. In our love for God we live as Jesus taught us and we draw ever closer to God in prayer.

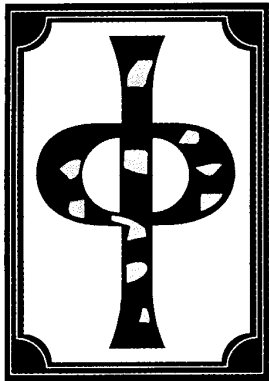
