#### **The Year of St. Paul 2008-2009 – The Beginnings of the Church** **Miletus: The Structure of the Church**

On the way back to Jerusalem, Paul ‘compelled by the Spirit’ (Acts 20:22), summoned the Elders of the Church of Ephesus. He foretold of his upcoming and inevitable imprisonment, persecution and death, as well as, the specific direction of his mission: “Go, I shall send you far away to the Gentiles: (Acts 22:21). He exhorted them to be vigilant, hard workers, and to assist the poor and the weak: “It is more blessed to give than to receive” (Acts 20:35). And finally, he left them as his last will and testament “building up the Church” (1 Cor. 14:12), or, rather, he commended it to the power of the Word saying: “I commend you to God and to that gracious word of his that can build you up” (Acts 20:32). Thus, the activity of the Word is primary; it creates the Church.

This event concluded with deep emotion: the assembly knelt down and prayed and they threw their arms around Paul (cf. Acts 20:36-37). They all entrusted themselves to God and to His Word. The episode is important for the institutional history of the church. For the Elders or the presbyters, who were summoned by Paul and whom he named pastors and bishops, appointed to give spiritual nourishment and guidance and to keep vigil (this is the meaning of the word bishop) over the people of God, did not receive their powers from the assembly of the faithful, but from the Spirit.

During the course of his “independent” ministry and in the face of some unusual situations, Paul had to adopt some doctrinal innovations in order to justify his continuous appeals to the believers to group together in united communities. Undeniably, Paul succeeded, wherever he went, in creating many Churches, extremely united in order to survive and develop outside the structures tied to the synagogues.

The principal teaching of today's Gospel is about invitation and rejection. At the end of the parable, the king discovers a guest who has come to the wedding feast improperly dressed. It was a huge social gaffe to show up without a wedding garment, and it was an insult and an affront to the king. He was bound hand and foot and thrown out of the wedding.

Jesus; parable invites us to consider our own “wedding garments” and ask ourselves if we are respectfully dressed at church. A deeper question is how our lives are dressed in the practice of our faith.

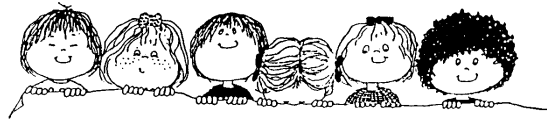

### School Zone - News from Grade 4:

Yes, it is true!! Rats are visiting in 4<sup>th</sup> grade. It is part of our science unit about nutrition. The class is conducting a 4 week animal feeding demonstration with two female laboratory rats. During this 4 week period, the rats are fed identical nutritional and calorie equivalent diets with the exception of the control rat receiving milk and experimental rat receiving a sweetened beverage. The rats' beverages are switched during the last week of the demonstration.

The students become the scientists by charting the growth of the rats. We do this by weighing the rats and measuring the length of their tails. We also observe the behavior of the rats during this time period. The students study the food groups and become familiar with the recommended daily allowances. In addition to the nutrition knowledge gained, the students learn how to make growth charts, are introduced to and work with the metric system, become familiar with the "scientific method" and accept responsibility of the rats' care. The demonstration itself is designed to help educate and emphasize the benefits of a well-balanced 5 food group diet and eating a balanced diet will allow them to grow strong bones, better bodies and grow to their full potential.

This program is provided to us by the American Dairy Association of Indiana and the Dairy and Nutrition Council. If you are involved in the dairy or milk industry, the 4<sup>th</sup> grade says "Thank You!!"

## WEEKLY APOLOGETICS

### Why do I need to confess that? It doesn't hurt anyone but me.

Who do my sins hurt? Who do your sins hurt? Only you? A popular misconception is that our sins hurt only us. It's common for me to hear someone say, "What's the big deal with (blank)? I'm only hurting myself." Ok, I'll say this as lovingly as I can: "That's a crock!" Sin runs deeper than that.

You know, at the beginning of Mass we say, as a community, "I confess to Almighty God, and to you, *my brothers and sisters*, that I have sinned through my own fault." Ever notice that we're admitting wrongdoing not only to God but *also* to the community of believers assembled with us?

Did you know that the sacrament of reconciliation didn't always take place in a safe little confessional box? Oh, no, get this: Everyone in the community would assemble at church, and at an appointed time at the beginning of Mass, one at a time, everyone would shout his or her sins *out loud*, in front of *everyone!* Stop and imagine that. Ya', it scares me, too.

What the people back then realized - that we don't realize now or don't want to admit that we realize - is that sin hurts everyone. When I sin, it doesn't just hurt me; it hurts others, some whom I know about and some whom I don't.

Have you ever sat in the nonsmoking section near the smoking section? Sin can be like secondhand smoke. The sinner might not realize or admit that his or her "smoke" is having an effect on others. Those inhaling the smoke may or may not realize it, but the smoke *does* have an unhealthy effect. You see, once the smoke (sin) is out there, there's no way to control its effects or its harm to other people.

I have had a number of friends who think that if they "smoked out," or drank, or whatever, those decisions and their consequences stopped with them. That's not the case. We are all one body, those who realize it and those who don't. Our actions, good or bad, affect other people. All of our actions.

I took a hard look at my own life recently to see if any of my own "secondhand sin" might be making others' faith walks more difficult. The answer was yes, and I've had to make some tough changes. But by the grace of God and prayers from fellow Christians, like you, I continue to get better.

How about you? Any changes needed?

## **Vote Your Faith**

As the elections draw near, we as Catholics are called to listen to God's voice as we exercise our privilege and right to vote. The following information is for each individual to investigate for themselves the views of the Catholic Church on the many social issues of our time.

Information is quoted directly from the "*United States Catholic Catechism for Adults*", the first official catechism produced by the nation's bishops since the creation of the *Baltimore Catechism*, first produced in 1885 and revised in 1941.

All of the Church's social teaching is rooted in the fundamental principle of the sacredness of human life and the fundamental dignity of every single individual.

Issues to be aware of:

***The Life and Dignity of the Human Person*** - Our belief in the sanctity of human life and the inherent dignity of the human person is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching.

***Call to Family, Community and Participation*** - The family is the central social institution that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined.

***Rights & Responsibilities*** Every person has a fundamental right to life to those things required for human decency.

***Option for the Poor and Vulnerable*** - A basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring.

***The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers*** - The economy must serve the people, not the other way around. Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's creation.

***Solidarity*** - We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences.

***Care for the Environment*** - We are called to protect people and the planet. Living our faith in relationship with all's God's creation.

## **A Prayer for our Nation as we Prepare to Elect our Leaders**

*For nine weeks, from now until Election Day (November 4), Priests for Life call upon believers to participate in the "Election Novena" by saying the following prayer each day:*

O God, we acknowledge you today as Lord, not only of individuals, but of nations and governments. We thank you for the privilege of being able to organize ourselves politically and of knowing that political loyalty does not have to mean disloyalty to you. We thank you for your law, which our Founding Fathers acknowledged and recognized as higher than any human law. We thank you for the opportunity that this election year puts before us; to exercise our solemn duty not only to vote, but to influence countless others to vote and to vote correctly. Lord we pray that your people may be awakened. Let them realize that while politics is not their salvation their response to you requires that they be politically active. Awaken your people to know that they are not called to be a sect fleeing the world, but rather a community of faith renewing the world. Awaken them that the same hands lifted up to you in prayer are the hands that pull the lever in the voting booth. That the same eyes that read your Word are the eyes that read the names on the ballot and that they do not cease to be Christians when they enter the voting booth. Awaken your people to a commitment to justice to the sanctity of marriage and the family. To the dignity of each individual human life and to the truth that human rights begin when human lives begin and not one moment later. Lord, we rejoice today that we are citizens of your kingdom may that make us all the more committed to being faithful citizens on earth. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### **Adult Faith Formation Survey**

Earlier this summer our Adult Catechetical Team (ACT) asked adults one weekend at masses to fill out a survey. The survey results will be used by ACT to provide continued faith formation to our adults and families. We received great participation. Thank you for taking time to give us your opinions on what will work well for St. Mary's. Listed here are some of those results:

**Family or Home Centered Activities** – most liked the idea of a monthly calendar with ideas for nourishing faith, and of learning about Catholic Internet sites.

**Small Groups** – most would like scripture study or faith-sharing for specific groups.

**Large Groups** – the majority like the idea of having speakers and workshops. Many also like combining pot-luck dinners with these programs.

**Individual Activities** – The top choice is to have materials available for personal prayer and independent study.

While these are the top results, there were many people interested in some other ideas on our survey and we will offer those as well. This survey gives ACT goals to work towards and also affirms much of what we already offer here at St. Mary's Parish. Presently we are having our bible study on St. Paul and his teachings. Currently there is a group meeting on some Wednesday mornings with information geared toward mothers. We also publish websites in our bulletin often, have speakers, missions, retreats, mission trips, and a resource library full of materials for individual prayer and study. We hope to have a parenting workshop soon as well as a Lenten mission. Keep looking for information on these and more in your weekly bulletin.

### **Stewardship/What's the difference between Stewardship and tithing?**

In terms of financial resources, Stewardship invites parishioners to give a percentage of their income that represents their sacrifice to the parish and other charities. Tithing is the biblical notion of giving one-tenth (10%) of our money. Good stewards reflect upon their current level of giving, and consider "Taking-a-Step" to a higher level of giving, if possible. The ultimate goal may be to achieve the biblical tithe, or it could be less or more, depending upon what a person/family has concluded through prayer and reflection. The important thing is to take the first step of faith by putting God first.
